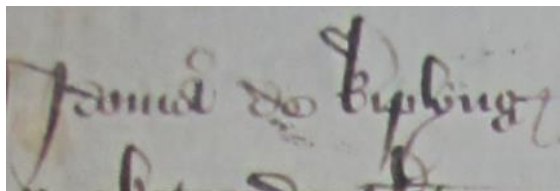
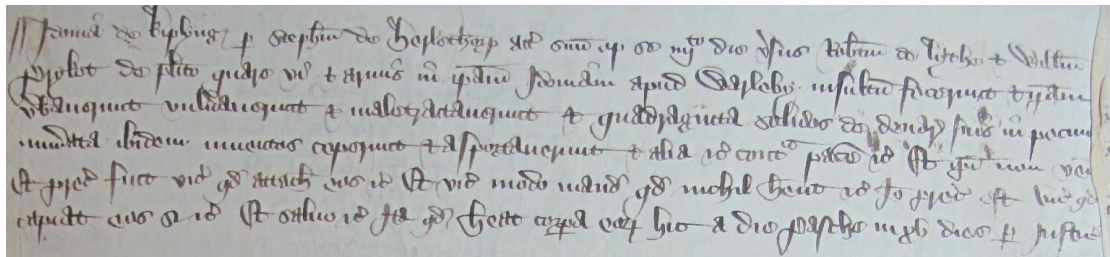


Early Kipling (excl. Balderdale)

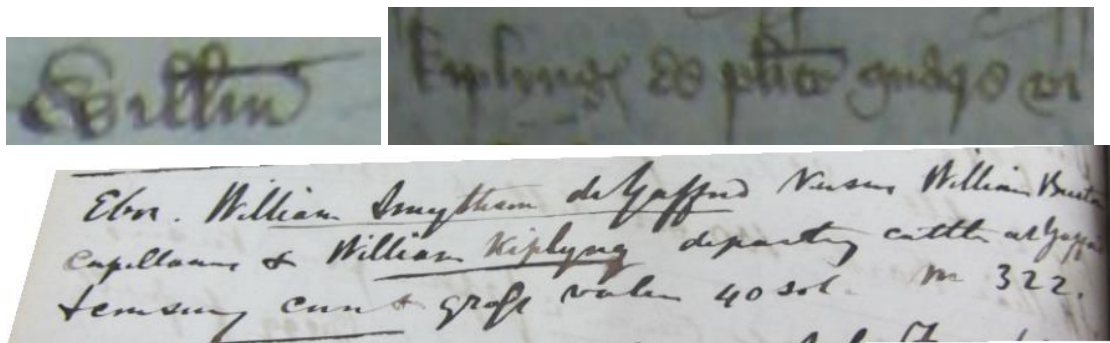
Plantagenet Harrison records an entry in the Quo Warranto Rolls for Mich 7 Edward I (1278) for the use of the name at Huddeswell in Swaledale. He also records a William Kippeling paying tax of 4s in the subsidy roll of 6 Edward III (1332/3) at Hippleswell, also in Swaledale. I have yet to validate these at TNA

Next is an Idonea (sic) Kipling in 1371.

In the Common Pleas Roll of Mich 12 Henry IV (1379-80) CP40/599/m322 is a reference to a William Kipling depasturing cattle at Yafford (Yafforth, nr Northallerton).

[THORMANBY, a parish in the wapentake of Bulmer, and liberty of Ripon; 4 miles NW. of Easingwold]

At Thirsk, a John Kyplinge als Lunde was buried in 1560 as was an Agnes Kylinge in 1564. The following baptisms were also recorded: Jane d of John Lunde (1560), Elenor d of John Kyplinge (1561), James s of John Kyplinge (1564), Anne d of John Lunde (1566) and Thomas s of John Lunde (1568). A further John Kyplinge als Lunde was buried in 1569 as was Agnes, "wife of John Lunde". (D&VM)

In 1574, a John Kiplinge was left 20s in the will of the parson of Cockfield:

WILL OF RICHARD BAYLES.

Dec. 16, 1574. Richerd Baylls, parson of Cockefeild. I geve to Nicholas Ludge and Christofer Ludge, 3*l.* 6*s.* 8*d.* to bye two sommer nages. To Jenkyne Myddleton one whye, or ells 13*s.* 4*d.* To John Bell of Rumbey parishe, 3*l.* 6*s.* 8*d.*, if my goods will serve to dischardge all suche. Quarter Sessions Records

A Henry Kipling was ordained deacon at Rose Castle, the seat of the Bishop of Carlisle, on 21 December 1617 and priest the following year.

In the possession of the York Lodge, No. 236, is an old MS. on paper, dated 1693, and signed by one "Mark Kypling," purporting to be a copy of the Ancient Constitutions of the Freemasons made by himself. The Roll is signed by five other Brethren, one of whom calls himself the Lodge Warden. This MS. was presented to the Grand Lodge at York in 1777 by a Bro. Walker, of Wetherby, who was, I believe, the Master of the Alfred Lodge held at that place and long extinct,

Ars Quatuor Coronatorum, 1889

It has been taken for granted by some brethren that the "York MS. No. 4," of A.D. 1693, which has the following statement, following the Scroll proper, signed by Mark Kypling

"The names of the Lodg
William Simpson | Christopher Thompson
Anthony Horsman | Christopher Gill
Mr. Isaac Brent, *Lodge Ward*,"

refers to the old York Lodge, but, as already mentioned, its custodian prior to 1777 is unknown, and so the Lodge remains unidentified. It is a pity such is the case, for although the text is not of any special value, the Roll is remarkable for a transcriber's error, which has caused quite a needless amount of discussion as to the admission of females into Masonic Lodges at that period, some even accepting the clause in question as proof of such a custom, as I originally was inclined to do.²

"The one of the elders takeing the Booke and that *hee or shee* that is to bee made Mason shall lay their hands thereon and the charge shall be given."

Undoubtedly the word *she* is a stranger in all the scores of Rolls known, and is a mistake for *they*. The Latin clause reads *ille vel illi*, not *illa*.

Ars Quatuor Coronatorum, 1900

Roll No. 4 is dated 1693 and appears to have been written by Mark Kypling, and there are also several signatures of Officers or Members of the Lodge attached to it.

It was written on a roll of paper 10½ft. long and was given to the Grand Lodge by Bro. George Walker, of Wetherby, in 1777.
