The elder William's birth record has not been found, but the family group most probably traces back to William Kipling who married Mary Widrop at Haughton-le-Skerne in 1782. Who was William? He may have been the William Kipling b Bowes Nov 1750, son of Thomas and Ann Kipling¹. This William had brothers John, Joseph and Thomas (and James). But what took him from Bowes to Haughton?

¹ This Thomas was the illegitimate son of Dorothy Kipling of Mellwaters, daughter of Thomas Kipling of that place, and Charles Bayley. Also see the Bishop Thornton, Cragg and Missionary family groups, which may also be descended from Thomas.

John made a will in 1836 when he was living at Howden House in Aycliffe. He left to his wife Mary various freehold properties and gardens in Aycliffe occupied by John Robinson and Charles Law. Following her death, they were to go to daughter Mary Robinson (wife of Robert) and then to any children she may have. Should Mary die childless, the properties were to be sold and half the monies to be distributed to the children of brothers Thomas and William and the other half to his wife's sister Isabella Dunbar and her children². The residue of the estate was to go to wife Mary.

This is the last Will and Testament of me John Kipling of Howden House in the Township of Aycliffe in the County of Durham made the Seventy first day of February one thousand eight hundred and thirty six. First I give devise and bequeath to my dear Wife Mary Kipling all that part of my Freehold Garden situate lying and being in the Village of Aycliffe aforesaid and now in the occupation of John Robinson

Widow Mary then became a housekeeper at an inn at Bishop Middleham. She married the landlord, George Dodsforth, in 1843.

WM. CUMMINGS (16), pleaded guilty to having, on the 11th of February, at Middlesbro', stolen a coat, two sacks, and a quantity of rope, the property of John Barron and Joseph Kipling.—The prisoner is a youth of weak intellect, and resides at Darlington; he was sentenced to be imprisoned for fourteen days only, to hard labour.

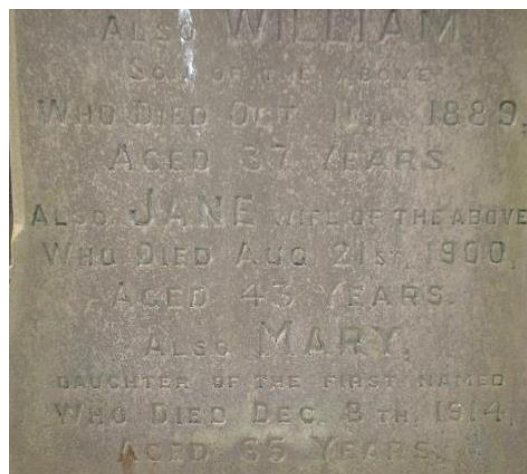
Joseph (Spensley) Kipling was the illegitimate son of Mary. Spensley and Hislop were the married names of William snr's sisters Margaret and Isabella.

RIPON LIBERTY AND WEST RIDING COURT.—Yesterday, before Mr. J. S. Hurst (chairman), Major Powell, Mr. Bower, and Major Busfield.—Henry Florentine, of Ripon, stonemason, was charged on the information of George Hall, gamekeeper to Lord Grantley, with trespassing in pursuit of game on land at Bridge Hewick in the occupation of John Hutchinson, on the 25th December. George Hall stated that on Christmas Day he saw the defendant ranging Mr. Hutchinson's field with a dog. He would be there twenty minutes. Defendant told him he had leave from Mr. Hutchinson, which was false. Defendant would be 40 or 50 yards from the footpath. Fined 11s, including costs; in default seven days.—Joseph Moore and James Moore, of Grewelthorpe, labourers, were charged with assaulting Arthur Storey, of Grewelthorpe, farmer, on January 1st. In this case the prosecutor did not appear, and the case was adjourned.—Inspector Booth reported cases of sheep scab at Volla House and Caveless House, Bishop Thornton.—Mr. Gowland (Edmundson and Gowland) applied for the transfer of the licence of the Shoulder of Mutton Inn, Mickley, to James Ridsdale, the previous tenant, Mitchell, having gone away without leaving his address. The application was granted.—Temporary authorities were granted to Mrs. Kipling, of the Crown Inn, and Charles Coldbeck, of the Crab Tree Inn, both at Grewelthorpe.

RIPON.

RIPON LIBERTY ADJOURNED QUARTER SESSIONS. Yesterday (before Mr. J. S. Hurst, chairman, Mr. R. Williamson, Major Pollard, and Mr. W. F. Powell). The Mayor of Ripon (Ald. Smith) qualified as a magistrate for the Liberty. Charles Flynn was appointed billet-master for the Liberty, in place of his brother resigned. The fines imposed on William Dawson Wood, of Bishop Monkton, and Henry Horseman, of Bishop Thornton, for non-attendance as jurors at the last Quarter Sessions were remitted on presentation of affidavits. The same justices sat for the Liberty and West Riding Petty Sessional Court, when temporary authorities were granted to Charles Colbeck, of the Royal Oak, Grewelthorpe, Jane Kipling, of the Hackfall Inn, in the same village, and Thomas P'Anson, late of Thirsk, for the Yorkshire Hussar, Markington. A 14 days' dramatic license was granted for the Victoria Hall, Ripon.

Sadly, the following month Jane needed to be admitted to the West Yorkshire Asylum at Menston, where she later took her own life.

SUICIDE OF A RIPON INNKEEPER.

On Wednesday morning Mr. T. P. Brown, the coroner for the Skipton district, held an inquiry at Menston Asylum into the death of Jane Kipling, a patient in that institution, and lately an innkeeper in Westgate, Ripon, who committed suicide on Tuesday by suffocating herself with a waterproof sheet. Mr. John Clapham was appointed foreman of the jury.

Robert Herring, farm bailiff, of Neasham, near Darlington, said the deceased was his sister, and was the widow of William Kipling, who was a joiner. Previous to being admitted to the Asylum in June last she was an innkeeper.

Sarah Brown, charge nurse in No. 17 Ward, said Mrs. Kipling was under her care. On Tuesday morning witness went on duty at seven o'clock. There were 64 patients in the ward.

The Coroner: Did you notice this woman at all?—Yes.

At what time did you notice her?—Soon after seven o'clock.

How did she appear? Anything different to her demeanour?—No; there was nothing different. She was always excited.

Had she any breakfast?—Yes; at eight o'clock.

You noticed nothing different?—No.

Who first drew your attention to anything?—Nurse Wilson.

About what time?—Half-past nine.

What was her state then?—She was lying on the floor with a waterproof sheet wrapped round her.

Was she unconscious when you got the sheet off her?—Yes.

She was not dead?—No; she was not dead. She died soon afterwards?—Yes.

Had you any special directions with regard to this case?—I knew she was a suicidal patient.

In reply to the Coroner, Herring said he had nothing to ask the witness.

You think that so far as the witness is concerned there is no blame?—Herring: No.

Edith Wilson, nurse, said she went into No. 17 Ward at about half-past nine o'clock. She saw Mrs. Kipling lying on the floor, and she immediately called Nurse Brown's attention to her. In No. 17 Ward, besides the day room, there were six side-rooms, in which violent patients were placed. Mrs. Kipling was in one of these. The waterproof sheet she was wrapped up in was for putting on the bed.

Dr. Samuel Edgerson, one of the medical staff at the Asylum, said Mrs. Kipling was admitted on the 14th of June last.

The Coroner: Was there any predisposition to suicide?—She was mentioned as "doubtfully suicidal" when she came in.

How did your opinion alter with regard to her?—I thought she was possibly suicidal, and gave directions to that effect.

And reviewing what has taken place, is there any alteration you would suggest, suppose you had it to do over again?—In the treatment?

Yes?—I do not think so. A card was issued to the nurse that she was suicidal and was not to be lost sight of. In reply to further questions, the doctor said there were two forms of cards issued to the nurses, one red and one white. The red card was for those actively suicidal. He did not consider that the deceased came under this category, and kept her under the "white" card treatment the whole of the time.

In accordance with the Coroner's suggestion, the jury returned a verdict that the deceased suffocated herself whilst in an unsound state of mind, and made no recommendation.
