


The Kiplings of Kirkbymoorside

Thomas Kipling (1693-1750)


Thomas Kipling was baptised on 10 Feb 1693 at Holy Trinity Goodramgate, York. He was admitted a freeman of the city of York by patrimony in 1713/14 and married Elizabeth Rhodes on 27 Dec 1715 at Saint Laurence, York. (see 'The Kiplings of York').

Thomas and his wife lived at Kirkbymoorside ('KM'), where Gertrude 'daughter of Thomas Kipling, gentleman' was baptised the following year.

Baptized 2: November 1718


... as were further children Elizabeth (1720), Mary (1722) and Thomas (1726).

In 1721, he recorded a property transaction in the City of York deeds registry.





The death of his widow, “Mrs Elizabeth Kipling”, is recorded in 1774.

In his will, Thomas left one shilling to son Charles, £5 to each of Elizabeth and Gertrude and the remained to wife Elizabeth and son Thomas.




His assets were valued at £19 6s, including a debt of £11 due from Nicholas Barker. The nominal legacy to Charles was probably because money had been given to him previously (e.g. on his marriage).

Gertrude was mentioned in court case in 1735 and married in York in 1747.



Elizabeth married a Joseph Volens, a linen draper of York, at St Martins & St Gregory in 1774. Their daughter Mary Kipling Volens was christened at Holy Trinity (Christ Church) in 1776....



... but died two years later and was buried at Fulford, outside York.

Charles Kipling (1718-1803)

Charles married at KM in 1744.

A daughter Elizabeth was baptised at KM in 1745, as was a son John in 1747.

Charles was a sailor. He was admitted a freeman of York by patrimony in 1758, when he was incorrectly described as a gentleman and his brother Thomas (see below) as a mariner rather than vice versa.

He appears in various of the muster roles of Whitby Merchant Seamen's Hospital (as paying a 6d contribution for (pension/life insurance), initially described as a seaman and later as a cook. The first two entries were in 1761 on the *Lark*, for the second of these he joined at Deptford. These were followed in 1762 for the *Harmony*, joining at Shields and leaving at London, in 1763 for the *Providence* (Whitby/ Shields), in 1765 for the *Joseph & Hannah*, and in 1768 for the *John and Dorothy* (when Charles is noted as being aged 50). Other employments beginning/ending in Shields/Whitby were noted in 1772 and 1771, both on the *Lark*. Finally, there was a 1774 stint on the *Dolphin* (Shields/Bristol).

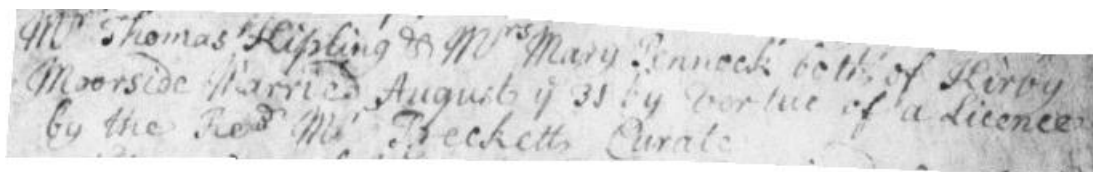
Sarah (70) and Charles (84) died in KM in 1791 and 1803 respectively.

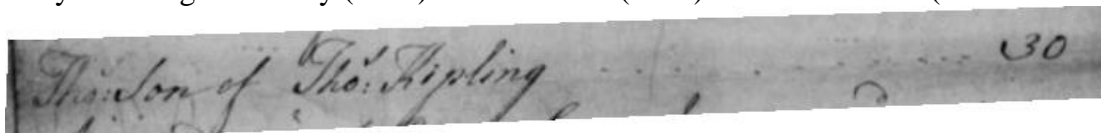
Thomas Kipling (1726-60)

They had daughters Mary (1751) and Elizabeth (1752) and son Thomas (December 1754).



Thomas was a coroner, as three records from the North Riding quarter sessions show.

At THIRSK, October 3, 1752.

The Thr^t. to pay to Tho. **Kipling**, gentⁿ., one of his Majesty's coroners for this Riding, £2. 14. 3, being his fees of 9d. a mile stipulated by a late Act of Parliament for taking two inquisitions, one at Hutton Bushell, sixteen miles from Kirbymoorside, which is the place of the coroner's abode, and the other in the parish of Lestingham, three miles from his said abode.

At THIRSK, May 1, 1753.



In 1736 and 1756, Thomas was involved in a property transaction at Barugh and Little Barugh.





In August 1755 the death of “Mary Skelton, wife of Mr Thomas Kipling” is recorded. Skelton was Mary’s mother’s maiden name.



In 1758, Thomas was (like his brother) admitted to the freedom of York by patrimony. He is erroneously described as being a “mariner” (which was his brother’s occupation, see above).



Thomas died in 1760.

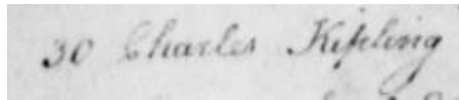
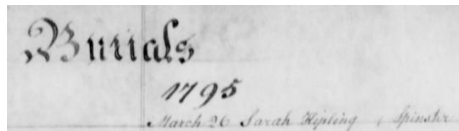
In 1774, daughter Mary (of Pickering) sold to her sister Elizabeth (of York) her share in property at Appleton-in-the-Moor they had inherited from their mother’s family. Elizabeth then sold the whole property later in the year.

Mary married a Thomas Campion at Pickering in 1780.

John Kipling (1747-1831)

An illegitimate son of a Jane Yowart , John Kipling Yowart, was baptised in KM in 1774. It is possible that John was his father. See Appendix.

Son **Charles** and daughter **Sarah** probably also died in Hull.



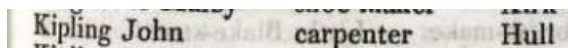
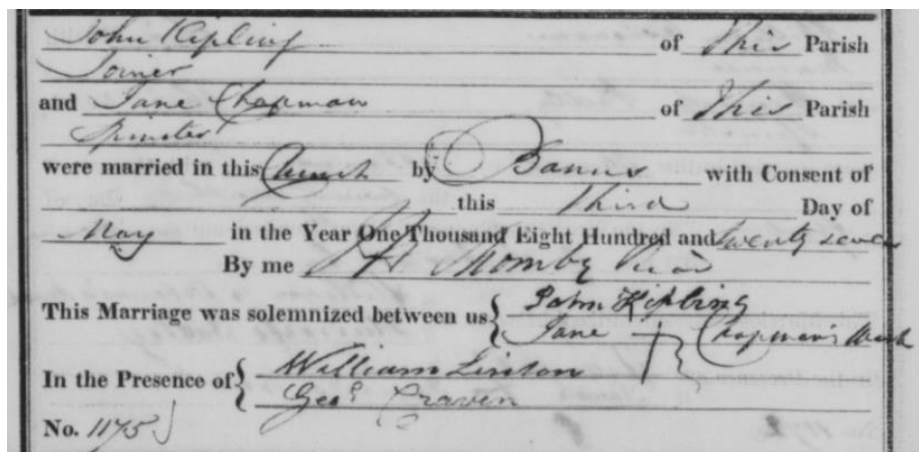
Holy Trinity, Hull 1798

Mary died in 1822 (age matches).



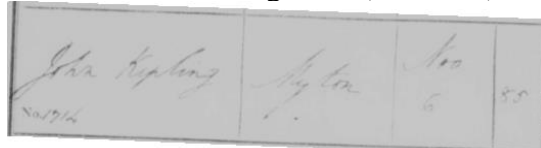
Holy Trinity, Hull 1822

In 1830, John was registered to vote for the MP for York. This would imply he owned property in York; had he inherited some from his father Charles?

KIPLING'S BANKRUPTCY.

WHEREAS a Commission of Bankrupt is
awarded and issued forth against JOHN
KIPLING, of the town of Kingston-upon-Hull,
Linen-Draper, Grocer, Dealer and Chapman; and
he being declared a Bankrupt, is hereby required to
surrender himself to the Commissioners in the said
Commission named, or the major part of them, on
the 5th and 8th days of September next, and on
the 31 day of October following, at eleven of the
clock in the forenoon on each of the said days, at
the Dog and Duck Tavern, in the said town of
Kingston-upon-Hull, and make a full discovery
and disclosure of his Estate and Effects; when
and where the Creditors are to come prepared
to prove their Debts, and at the second sitting to
choose Assignees, and at the last sitting the said
Bankrupt is required to finish his examination, and
the Creditors are to assent to or dissent from the
allowance of his Certificate.

All Persons indebted to the said Bankrupt, or
that have any of his Effects, are not to pay or
deliver the same but to whom the Commissioners
shall appoint, but give notice to Mr. WILLIAM
WALMSLEY, Solicitor, No. 24, Parliament-street,
Hull; or to Mr. EGERTON, Solicitor, No. 3,
Gray's Inn-Square, London.

POLICE.—On Wednesday week, J. Jackson, victualler, was convicted of keeping open his house early in the morning, and suffering persons to tipple therein, contrary to the condition of his recognizance, and was fined 10s. with costs. On Wednesday last, John Kipling, victualler, was convicted of a similar offence, and fined 40s. with costs.

Wife Jane died in 1828, when John's work was described as a (ship-)broker.

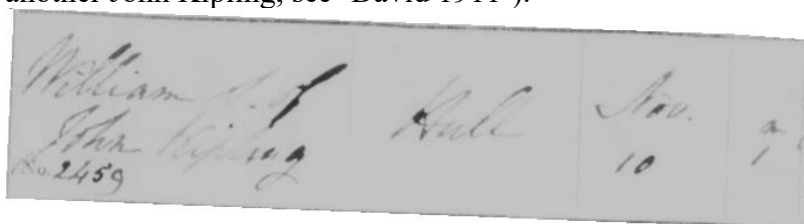

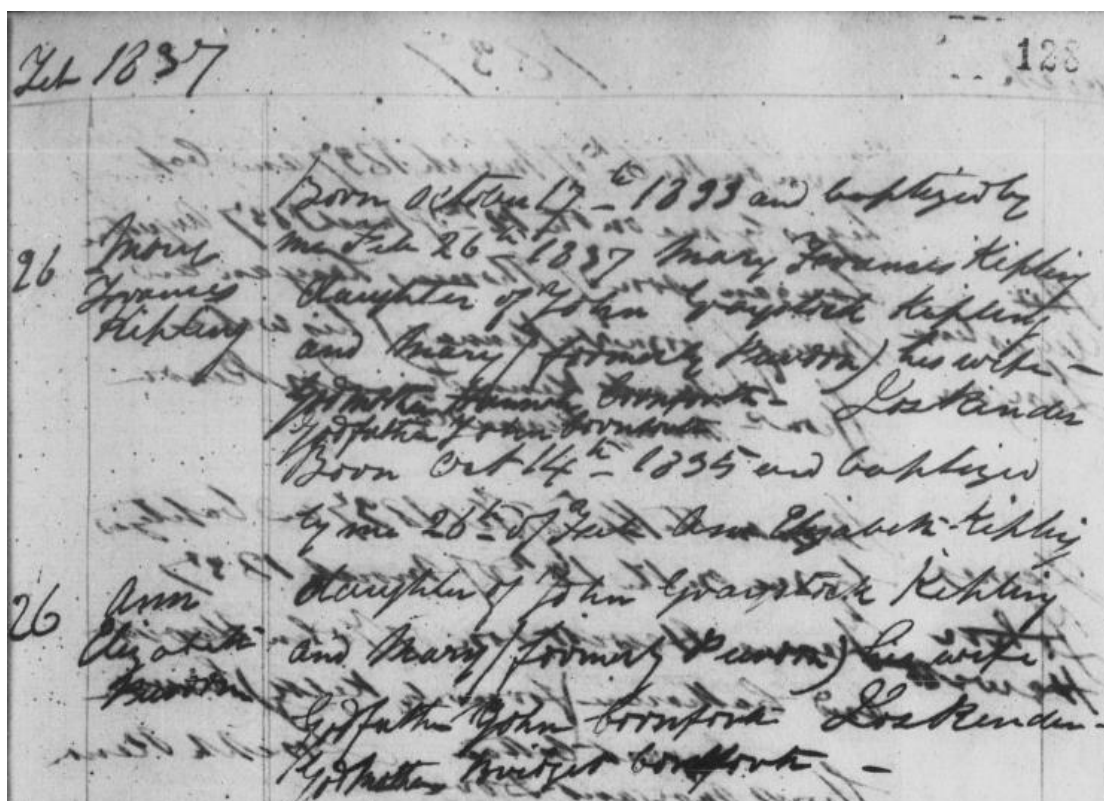

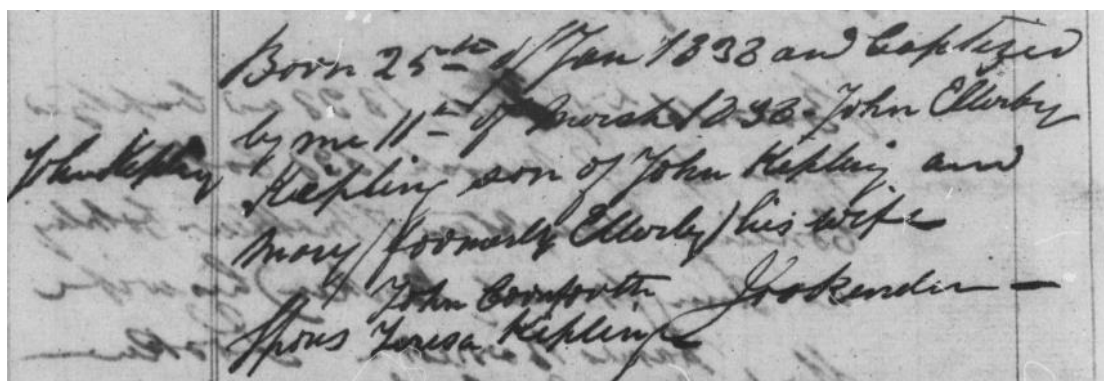


HT 1832 (age 1 mo)

Mary was also reported in the local press around this time featuring in concerts.

CONCERT.—A grand concert was given at the Temperance-hall, on Monday evening, by Mr. H. Deval, of Hull. The principal performers were Miss M. Kipling, Mr. B. Gale, Master Geo. Crouch, the celebrated violinist, and Mr. C. Hull, Bugle Major of the 85th Light Infantry. Mr. H. Deval presided at the piano-forte. The concert was numerous and respectably attended, and the company appeared highly gratified.

Hull Packet - Friday 16 January 1852

CONCERT.—On Tuesday evening last, a vocal and instrumental concert was given by Herr Sablotny, organist to the German Lutheran Church, assisted by a portion of the band of the 21st Regiment, in the hall of the Mechanics' Institute, George-street. The principal vocalists were Miss M. Kipling (pupil of Mr. H. Deval), Mr. W. W. Wilson, Mr. T. B. Gale, and Mr. H. Deval. Soloist—Herr Sablotny. The orchestra was ably conducted by Mr. H. Deval, and scientifically led by Mr. J. Wilson. Herr Sablotny was loudly applauded in De Beriot's 7th solo; Miss M. Kipling gave great satisfaction—she had to re-appear in almost every song which she had been appointed to sing. The other vocalists also acquitted themselves in a very creditable manner. The instrumental part of the performance was also well executed. The attendance was respectable but not numerous.

Hull Daily News - Saturday 17 April 1852

CONCERT AT THE MECHANICS' INSTITUTE.—Herr Sablotny gave his second vocal and instrumental concert in the saloon of the Mechanics' Institute, on Thursday evening. There was a numerous attendance. Barnett's Cavatina, "Deep in the forest dell," Loder's ballad, "The lily of St. Leonard's," and Beauthin's "Buy my moss roses," were sung in a very creditable manner by Miss M. Kipling, who has improved considerably of late. Her voice is clear, natural, and pleasing, and we have no doubt she will ere long become an excellent vocalist. Morning on's glee, "Here in cool grot," and Bishop's amusing "Mynbeer van Dunk," were well sung, and were received with applause, as was also Glover's duet, "Gently sigh the evening breezes," which was sung by Miss Kipling and Miss A. Newman. Proch's "Das Alpenhorn" was sung by Herr Sablotny, but not so efficiently as we anticipated. The instrumentalists played exceedingly well, and were warmly applauded. Mr. Alexander Stacey presided at the piano-forte with precision and taste.





John Kipling Yowart, son of Jane Yowart - March 2


The death of a "Jane Yoward, age 66" is recorded at KM in 1802, although there is no sign of her birth in KM around 1736.

John Kipling Yoward was probably also the John Yoward (of Simmington) who married Elizabeth Hugill in KM in 1797. Daughters Jane (1813) and Mary Anne (1815) were born in Acklam By Malton, daughters of "John Yoward and Elizabeth".

Mary Ann Yoward married tailor Jonathan Mason at KM in 1837. When their daughter Ann Elizabeth was baptised at KM in 1840, Mary Ann was described as “daughter of John and Eliz. Kiplin”.
