

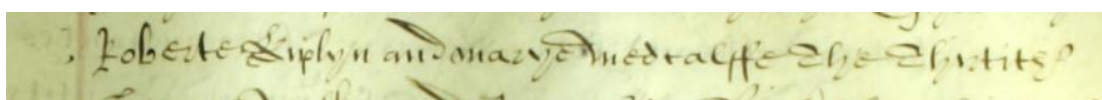
The Kiplings of 16th, 17th and 18th century London

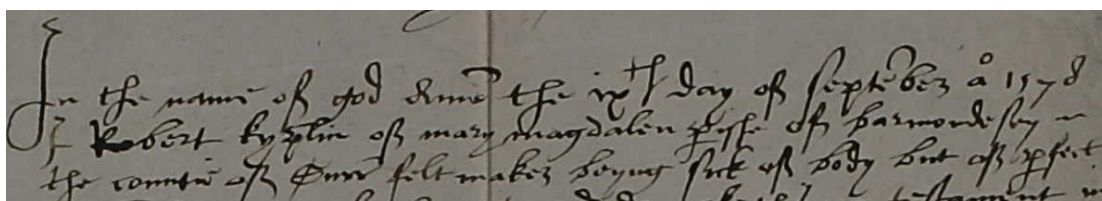

The earliest mention yet discovered of the Kipling name in London is of Robert Kiplyn, who married Marye Medcalffe in 1577:

Was he the same Nicholas Kipling of Yorkshire who made a complaint of debt at the Court of Common Pleas the same year against Nicholas Walton of Richmond, cooper, for a debt of 70s, Robert Langstaff of Richmond, labourer (53s 4d), and Henry Grave of Doncaster, butcher (40s)? And a second against Thomas Allanson, chapman (£8 15s), Michael Horne, glover (100s), and John Peacocke, clothworker (73s 4d), all of Barnard Castle, and George Aldersey of Cogdon in Swaledale, yeoman (40s). Was Nicholas one of the Lartington Kiplings?

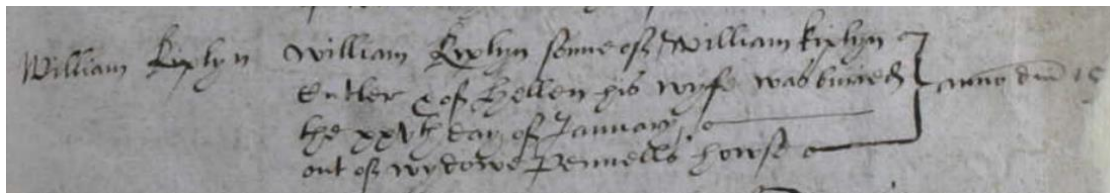

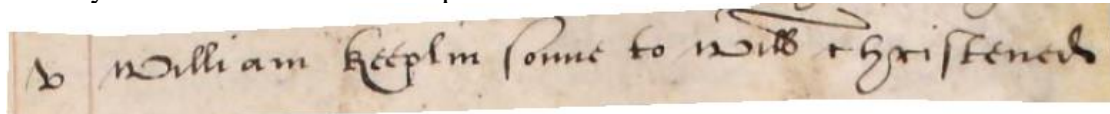



It seems likely that he was the George Kiplyn summonsed along with other London merchants by the Attorney-General, Edward Coke, to appear before the court of Star Chamber in 1600 to answer an accusation of monopolising and profiteering from the trade in coal between London and Newcastle. George died in 1610, when of Thames Street, A.H. Gt, with administration of his estate being granted to Anne as his relict. [PCC Wills Vol V 1609-1619. Pg196]

Meanwhile, in 1615, Anthony Kipling, son of Michael of 'Barncastle, Yorks' (presumably Barnard Castle, Durham) shoemaker was apprenticed to John Baylie of the Wax Chandlers' Company (see "The Kiplings of Barnard Castle"). Was he the same Anthony who was whipped in 1614?

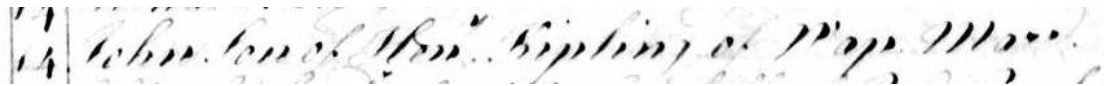
Henry, another son of John Kipling (this time “cordwainer”), was apprenticed to John Heydon, plumber, on 29 September 1699. The record then states “29 September 1703 now at sea”.

He was probably not Henry Kipling, mariner, who married Jane Nation in 1720 and had a number of children.



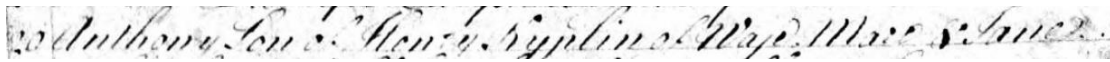

Returning to the first Henry, he ("plumber & widower") married a Martha Grant in 1725 (well before some of the children born to Henry and Jane, so not the same Henry).

A George Kipling, b c 1725, married in 1763.

He may have been the George who witnessed a deed in 1758 relating to property in Great Queen Street [*Bedfordshire record office: Z1093/2/1*].

He may have been the George Kipling who for many years was Clerk in the Tenths Office (which collected certain church taxes). He is listed in the *Royal Kalendar* from 1767 to 1798.




He was taxed at Chapel Street, St Andrew & St George, from at least 1780 to 1794.

George died in January 1794, aged 69, leaving all his estate to his widow, Mary, apart from a legacy to his niece Mary Ann Pound (nee Kipling, see below).



Register of Burials at Maze Pond Baptist Chapel in Southwark



He was probably also the licensed victualler listed in 1788 and 1789.



Almost certainly, Thomas and wife Mary were witnesses in an Old Bailey sodomy trial in 1755. He (his first name is not mentioned in the trial report) was a pew-opener at the “chapel in Chandler Street” as well as “belonging to the Penny-Post-Office”. Chandler Street is in the East End, not Westminster, however.

Mr. Kipling. Hearne had said scandalous accusations against Mr. Bradbury; but what it was I did not know. There was a paper wrote,

and the boy read it; and said, he was very sorry for what he had said against Mr. Bradbury, and he went on his knees, and ask'd him and God pardon. Mr. Bradbury said, God forgive you, for I do; for you are a wicked boy.

Q. When was this?

Kipling. This was on the Wednesday, the day before the paper was lost; about the middle of April last.

Q. Was he threatened?

Kipling. No; not in the least.

Q. Was he put in fear?

Kipling. I did not see he was in any fear at all.

Q. What induced the boy to sign it?

Kipling. I believe he might be afraid Mr. Bradbury might hurt him, for scandalizing him; the boy express'd great sorrow, and cry'd very much. On the 18th of April, I saw him again in my kitchen.

Council. Look at the paper (he takes it in his hand.)

Kipling. My name here is my own hand writing, I saw the boy sign this paper.

Q. Was there any compulsion or force on him, did you observe?

Kipling. There was none at all, I am certain of it; he appear'd very brisk, it was sign'd by him, after it had been read over, and after he had read it himself.

Council. There is the name *Mary Kipling*, a witness; who wrote that?

Kipling. My Wife did.

Q. What state was she in, when she sign'd it; was she sober?

Kipling. I can't say she was right sober.

Q. Whose hands was the first recantation left in?

Kipling. It was left in Mrs. Pickering's hands, that was thought to be lost; the first and second were as near alike for words as could be.

Q. Who drew up the second?

Kipling. I do not know.

Cross examination.

Q. What is your employment?

Kipling. I belong to the Penny-post-office, and I open the pews in the chapel, in Chandler's-street, but I have no allowance for that.

Q. Did James Hearne lodge at your house?

Kipling. He spent one night at our house, about the 4th or 5th of April.

Q. What time did he come?

Kipling. He might come while I was out.

Q. Did you ever lose any thing from the chapel?

Kipling. There were a pair of candlesticks missing; but they were found again afterwards.

Q. Were they missing before, or after this charge against Bradbury?

Kipling. I can't say which; but to the best of my remembrance, it was after.

Q. Did you hear any thing about prosecuting the boy for them?

Kipling. No; I did not.

Hearne. I liv'd so about three days; then Mrs. Pickering, Mr. Kipling, Mr. Bradbury, and Mr. Cook came down to me in Kipling's cellar. There was Kipling's wife and daughter. Mrs. Pickering said, Mr. Cook had drawn up a recantation more to the purpose, and I was to sign it.

Q. Did you sign it?

Hearne. I d.d.

Q. Why did you sign it?

Hearne. I was as much afraid of them as before, because they were so strict to me to keep me down in the cellar. When this was signed, Mrs. Kipling was dead drunk, and her husband was drunk. Then I staid till the Sunday, and went with Mrs. Pickering to the Minories to a smith named Colegate, and she gave him a guinea to pay my passage to Dunkirk. Bradbury had told me that Mr. Brown and my father were looking after me, and it was he that propos'd my going abroad.


