

## The Kiplings of Ferrybridge and Doncaster

A James Kipling married at Ferry Fryston in the West Riding of Yorkshire in 1795. From his age at death (see below) he was born in 1771 or 1772. His origins have not been identified.

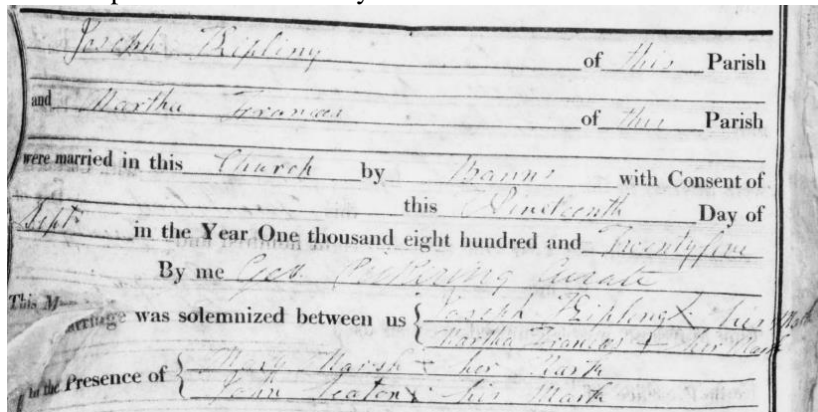

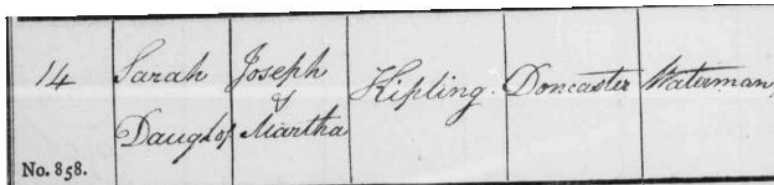
## Joseph Kipling

Son Joseph married the same year.



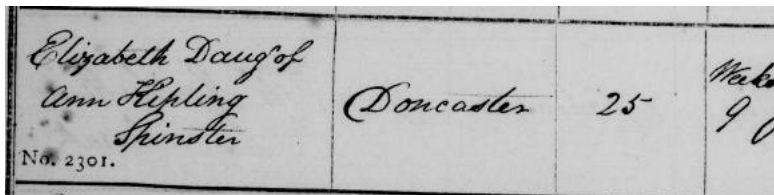

A daughter was born the following year. Her subsequent fate is unknown.



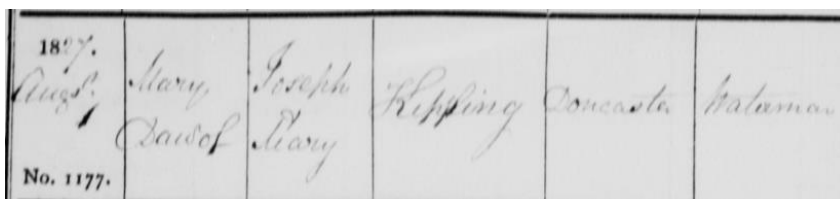
Doncaster May 1826

### **MANSLAUGHTER AT MASBRO' FEAST.**

A fight took place on Tuesday night last, (Masbro' feast,) at the Station Tavern public-house, in Masbro', which resulted in the death of Isaac Leesley, shoemaker, of Rawmarsh, aged 45, better known by the cognomen of "Foddy." Two men, named Isaac Jackson and Edward Pierpoint, were apprehended on Wednesday, and conveyed to Rotherham gaol, on the charge of having been concerned in the affray.

John Kiplin, of Masbro', stated, that he is the landlord of the Station Tavern. It was Masbro' feast on Tuesday, and deceased was at his house from half-past ten to twelve o'clock on Tuesday evening. He came to the bar window, and said his name was "Forty," or "Foddy;" he did not know which. He appeared a little tipsy. There were from seventy to eighty persons dancing up stairs. At from one to two o'clock, some women came and said, "They are going to fight," and he supposed they meant the company in the dancing room. Immediately after, seven or eight men came down stairs fighting hand over head. I seized a hawker of pots, named Dickenson, who was crying out "Murder!" at the bottom of the stairs, and put him out at the back door, they were using him so ill. The dancing ceased after this, and the parties who created the disturbance went away. Immediately after, he saw some men putting the man who called himself "Forty" or "Foddy" out at the front door. I heard there had been a pitched battle in the afternoon of the same day, but did not know any of the parties, nor the place where the battle was fought.... Edward Shepherd, rod roller, Masbro', stated that he was assisting as a waiter at Keplin's, on Tuesday.

After that, I accompanied him as far as the cut bridge at Masbro', which is about half-a-mile from Kiplin's. I assisted him that distance, and after he left me, he walked slowly, in a stooping posture, and with his hands supporting the lower part of his body.

.... Samuel Mortimer, of Rotherham, whitesmith, stated that he was present at Kiplin's at the time in question, when Bugg and John Myers had some sharp words.

I was in a lower room at Kiplin's, where I distinctly heard Myers and Pierpoint say, if they had not killed "Foddy," they had meant to do so.....

**SUDDEN DEATH OF A MAIL CART DRIVER AT ROTHERHAM.**—About half-past three o'clock on Sunday morning, as Police-constable Kershaw was on duty in Westgate he found John Kipling, the driver of the mail cart from the Post-office to Masbro' station, in a state of insensibility in his mail cart. He appeared to be suffering from the effects of a fit, and, after being removed, died very shortly.

**CAB ACCIDENT AT MASBRO'.**—An alarming collision between two cabs took place at Masbro' late on Saturday evening. One vehicle was driven by the brother-in-law of the owner, Mr. Crowther, and contained Mr. Chrimes and several other persons, who were on their way home from the railway station. The other was a cab belonging to Mr. Needham, and was in charge of a man named Kipling, who, having taken one fare from the station, was hastening back for another. The result of the collision was that Mr. Crowther's cab was smashed and rendered quite worthless, the inmates, though not seriously injured, being much alarmed and shaken. Mr. Needham's horse was also injured. The blame is laid upon the man Kipling, against whom proceedings will be taken by the police.

The constable stated that on the 25th ult. he was on duty at Woodhouse Mill, when he saw a horse and cab going along the road, apparently with no one in charge. On looking inside the cab he saw the defendant drunk and asleep.—A fine of 5s. and costs was imposed.

**FURIOUS DRIVING.**—James Kipling, waggonette driver, in the employ of Mr. Lambert, omnibus proprietor, was summoned for furious driving on Wednesday, the 8th inst. On that day he drove a waggonette and two horses from Attercliffe to Sheffield, and it was alleged that he caused the horses to gallop in front of a tramway car so as to impede the progress of the vehicle. The case was proved by Police-constable Allsop, and the defendant was fined 40s. and costs.—George Chapman, omnibus proprietor, was fined 20s. and costs for a like offence on the 7th inst.
