


Timothy Kiplin of Badsworth


Timothy Kiplin(g) was probably the 'neavey' (nephew) of John Kipling of Lartington who died in 1676, leaving 5s in his will to Timothy.¹

“Mr Timothy Kipling” of Headlam married Mary Collin in Gainford in 1676. A son Robert was baptised at neighbouring Winston in 1680 when Timothy was living at Westholme in that parish². Children Elizabeth and John Kiplin were baptised at Gainford in 1684 and 1687 respectively. According to his 1731 will, his eldest son was Timothy (Robert may have lived at Alne and Skelton-on-Ure, and died in 1728) and he also had daughters Mary, Hannah and Martha.

In 1677, John Langstaff of Baldersdale died. The inventory showed that he owed money to Timmothie Kipling “upon bond”



Timothy later became an official at the Bright family estate at Badsworth near Pontefract in the West Riding.

A daughter, Hannah, was baptised at Pontefract in February 1692.

In 1697, a John Kiplin, gent, of Hedingley [Headingley near Leeds] is named in a Chancery bill about a Pontefract property dispute [C 10/290/86]. He was one of the executors of a will.

¹ John Kipling (b1602) was the son of Nicholas Kipling of Lartington (b 1580). No other sons of Nicholas have been identified nor has a record of Timothy's baptism been found. 'Nephew' might, however, have had a wider meaning than sibling's son, including grandson or possibly an illegitimate son.

² The following baptism was recorded on 27 Jan 1688 at Winston:

Francis s. Margaret Simpson (ye daughter of Elizabeth Kipling, of Westholme) being Incestuously begotten by John Kipling, her mother's husband.

John Kiplin Gentleman

He may be the John Kiplin baptised in Leeds in March 1637/8, son of a Thomas Kiplin of March Lane.

Thomas had married Elizabeth Burrow in Pontefract in December 1637 (three months previously).

In 1665, Robert son of John Kiplin of Poole was buried at Otley.

Lidia Kipling had a daughter Elizabeth baptised at Adel in June 1666. Unusually for a seemingly legitimate birth, the mother's name is recorded rather than the father's.

In 1674, John Kiplin was amerced 4d as a free tenant of the manor of Poole. The same year, the burial of his wife, Sibbill, was recorded at Otley.

Also in 1674, Thomas's wife, Elizabeth was buried in Leeds.

In 1680, Thomas Kipling of Poole was buried at Otley (this may be the father who had come to live with his son). The fate of John, Lidia and/or Sibbill and young Elizabeth are not known.

It is conceivable that Thomas was of the Lartington Kiplings, as was Timothy.

In 1696, Timothy became secretary to the philosopher John Locke, probably in London.

Robert Liddell was probably the brother of Sir Henry Liddell who had married Catherine Bright, the heiress of the late Sir John Bright of Badsworth. If he was acquainted with Locke, it is possible that he recommended Kiplin for the position.

“Timothy Kiplin came to me.” — [Journal: MS. Locke f. 10, p. 23 = 331]

Before 1667 Locke was in Oxford, where there were fewer people who could have been requested, or commanded, to act as his amanuensis. Towards the end of his stay in France he engaged a new manservant, Sylvester Brounower, and once Brounower had learned enough English to undertake this kind of work, Locke usually used him as a copyist; when he left Locke's service in 1696 his successors, in particular [Timothy Kiplin](#) and William Shaw, acted in his stead. The handwriting of all three is readily identifiable.

Syl had not come back with Locke to Oates, for the previous month he had, after eighteen years' service as servant, valet, and amanuensis, left to take up employment (at twenty times the salary) as a clerk, under Popple as secretary to the Commissioners of Trade. No doubt Locke often came across him in Whitehall, but they remained more in touch than that, for Syl often shopped for various small items which he had delivered to Oates, where he was an occasional visitor. When they came to finalise the meticulous daily domestic accounts that Syl had kept, Locke was owed a sum approaching Syl's yearly wage; however, as the account book records, he generously decided to “remit and forgive the said debt of £3. 13. 11”. Some years earlier, when Syl had left Locke's service for a brief period, Locke had thought it would take a miracle to find someone else so “trusty, sober, diligent, well conditioned, read and write well, and some other good qualities, in fine excellent”. So Timothy Kiplin, who replaced him at 15s a quarter, 5s less than Syl, had a lot to live up to. From the very start “[Tim](#)” was not going to be as useful as his predecessor: for one thing he could not copy French.³¹

Timothy is recorded in connection with several Locke's letters and papers of 1696 and 1697 below.

Description: A working paper for the Board of Trade, written in the hand of Locke's manservant, Timothy Kiplin, except the title and opening lines in Locke's hand. According to Kammen, the paper was written late in August 1697, based on answers by James Blair to a list of queries from Locke (MS. Locke e. 9, ff. 39-42). Blair's answers directly influenced *The present state of Virginia, and the College* by Hartwell, Blair, and Chilton, and also formed the basis for instructions to the new Governor, Sir Francis Nicholson, in 1698.

Deus. Des Cartes's proof of a God from the idea of necessary existence examined (1696)

Location: [Bodleian Library, MS. Locke c. 28](#), f. 119-120.

Description: A paper endorsed “Deus Des Cartes’s proof of a god from the Idea of necessary existence examined 1696”. The endorsement and first few words are in Locke’s hand; the remainder is in the hand of Locke’s servant Timothy Kiplin, and therefore dating after Kiplin entered Locke’s service on 7 Nov. 1696. The manuscript consists of a sheet of paper folded once to form 4 leaves, 315 × 195 mm. The pages are divided into two equal columns; the text is written in the left-hand column, with a few additions by Locke in the right-hand column. Locke’s initials appear at the end of the text.

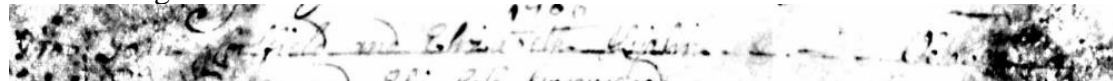
Description: A note with the marginal caption “Prophetia” and dated [16]97. The hand is that of Timothy Kiplin and is not signed by Locke.

Timothy then appears to have returned to the estate at Badsworth for his name can be found on a number of documents (See Appendix 1) between 1703 and 1719, mainly relating to property transactions (although in one of 1704 he is described as being a “gentleman, of Welbeck, Nottinghamshire).

In 1702, in a letter he wrote to Sir John Newton³ there is reference to Lord Thomas Fairfax standing again as MP for Yorkshire. (Glos. RO, Newton mss D.1844/C/10, Timothy Kiplin to Sir John Newton, 23 May 1702)

Daughter Elizabeth (aged 22) married John Horsfield of Sheffield at Badsworth in the West Riding in 1706.

Pontefract, St Giles and St Mary

By 1714, Timothy (it is not clear whether father or son) and John Kiplin were burgesses of the borough of Pontefract named in a petition to Parliament concerning an election in the Borough.

The House proceeded in the Reading of Petitions, left with the Clerk, touching controverted Elections; viz.

A Petition of Sir William Lowther Baronet, and Hugh Bethell, Esquire, and Christopher Heyford, Thomas Gilpin, Timothy Kiplin, George Jennings, Benjamin Radcliffe, David Medley, Robert Wood, John Popplewell, John Kiplin, John Hutchinson, Joshua Cooper, and John Ash, Burgesses of the Borough of Pontefract, in Com' York, on behalf of themselves, and others the Burgesses of the said Borough, was read; setting forth, That at the Election of Members for the said Borough, . . . William Lowther and Hugh Bethell, and the honourable John Dawson and Robert Frank Esquires, stood Candidates: The said Mr. Lowther and Mr. Bethell had the Majority of legal Votes; yet Robert Lowther Esquire, Mayor of the said Borough, has returned the said Mr. Dawson and Mr. Frank; and the Mayor did reject a great many legal Votes, who offered to poll for the said Mr. Lowther and Mr. Bethell; and likewise refused several Quakers, who offered to give their Affirmation; and the said Mayor admitted several illegal Votes to poll for the said Mr. Dawson and Mr. Frank; and that the said Mr. Frank, being Recorder, and during the said Election, directed the Mayor what Votes he should allow of, and what he should reject; and the said Mr. Lowther and Mr. Bethell demanded a Scrutiny, but the said Mayor refused one: And praying to be relieved.

Ordered, That the said Petition be referred to the Consideration of the Committee of Privileges and Elections: And that they do examine the Matter thereof; and report the same, with their Opinion thereupon, to the House.

A Motion being made, and the Question being put, That it be an Instruction to the Committee of Privileges and Elections, That they do hear the Matter of the Petition of Sir William Lowther Baronet, and Hugh Bethell Esquire, complaining of an undue Election and Return for the Borough of Pontefract, in the County of York, upon Wednesday the 7th Day of March next;

So it was resolved in the Affirmative.

Ordered, That it be an Instruction to the said Committee, That they do hear the Matter of the Petition of Wm. Lowther, Baronet, Hugh Bethell, Esquire, and Christopher Heyford, Thomas Gilpin, Timothy Kiplin, George Jennings, Benjamin Radcliffe, David Medley, Robert Ward, John Popplewell, John Kiplin, John Hutchinson, Joshua Cooper, and John Ash, Burgesses of the said Borough of Pontefract, on the behalf of themselves, and others the Burgesses of the said Borough, complaining of an undue Election and Return for the said Borough, at the same time.

Daughter Mary married John [Shernold/Shimins]? of Billingley in 1710, Martha married Robert Aislable of Rotherham in 1720, and Hannah married John Lightbowns of Alostock in 1721.

Martha's son later attended Trinity College, Cambridge.

Aislabe, William, eldest son of Robert Aislabe, of Rotherham, Yorks., by Martha Kiplin ; b. ; adm. (aged 9) May 1735 ; K.S. 1738 ; elected to Trin. Coll. Camb. 1742 (adm. pensr. July 7, 1742), did not matric. ; is said to have been ordained and to have been chaplain of H.M.S. Winchester ; d. unm. Oct. 2, 1759.

In his later life, Timothy appears to have become a farmer in his own right, although he witnessed the will of playwright William Congreve in 1725, presumably in London. Congreve, a Yorkshireman by birth, died in 1729.

Mary died at Badsworth in 1730 and Timothy died in 1731.

In his will, made in May 1721, Timothy left the bulk of his estate to his wife and son Timothy.

Mary having predeceased him, son Timothy became the sole executor and heir. The will listed the amounts already give on his children's marriages (£100 to his daughters and £200 to son John⁴).

⁴ Worth around £190,000 and £360,000 today, respectively, based on an index of average earnings.

Son Timothy did not outlive his father long, dying in 1739, although he was a subscriber to a book by Bishop Burnet in 1734. It is not known that he married or had children.

My dear friend, Mr. John [Kiplin](#), narrowly escaped drowning, not far from his own house. He was riding upon a high causey, which was overflown with water, and his horse slipt down off the causey; and tho' several people saw him, yet they could make him no help. But his Almighty Deliverer, who is ever present with us, saved him from this great danger; blessed be His holy name.

Wednesday, December the 8th, 1756.—It pleased God to deprive me of a very kind friend, whose society had been very agreeable to me ever since I had the happiness of being acquainted with him, viz. Mr. John Kiplin, of Ackworth. He had lingered a long time; his disorder was supposed to be the stone in his kidneys. He bore his troubles with great patience and submission to the will of God. He was a grave, sober man, and a serious, good Christian; universally belov'd in his neighbourhood, in which he was very useful, being of a benevolent spirit. He was buried nigh unto his father, &c., in the churchyard of Badsworth. He was 70 years of age, and left a widow behind him, but never had any child. He was buried the 8th of December, but dyed on the Lord's day morning, December the 5th. I have made a mistake on the foregoing page, when I said he dyed the 8th of December.

Thursday, October 18th, 1759

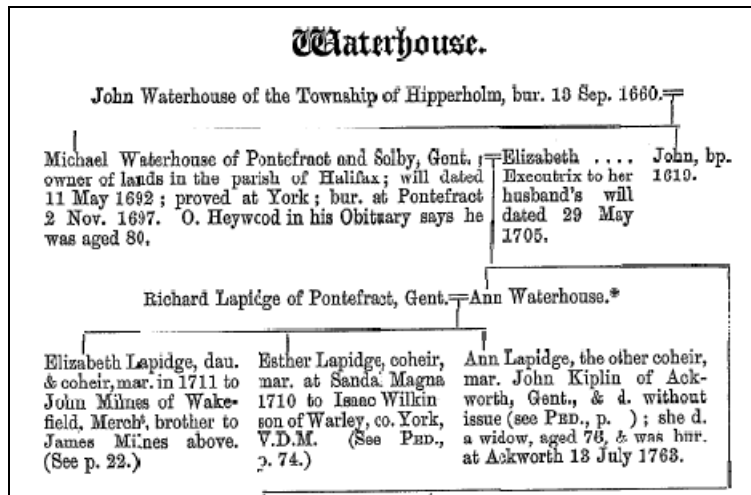
Mr. William [Shillito](#) acquainted me that Mr. [Wadsworth](#)⁵, of Sheffield, dyed about fortnight before, and that one of his sons was buried with him. I was sorry to hear this news, for he was a fine preacher, and highly esteemed at Sheffield by others, as well as his own constant hearers. He was most dearly beloved by his good old uncle Mr. [Kiplin](#); and, had he been now living, it would have been a great tryal to him. But I hope they are now united in the blessed society above.

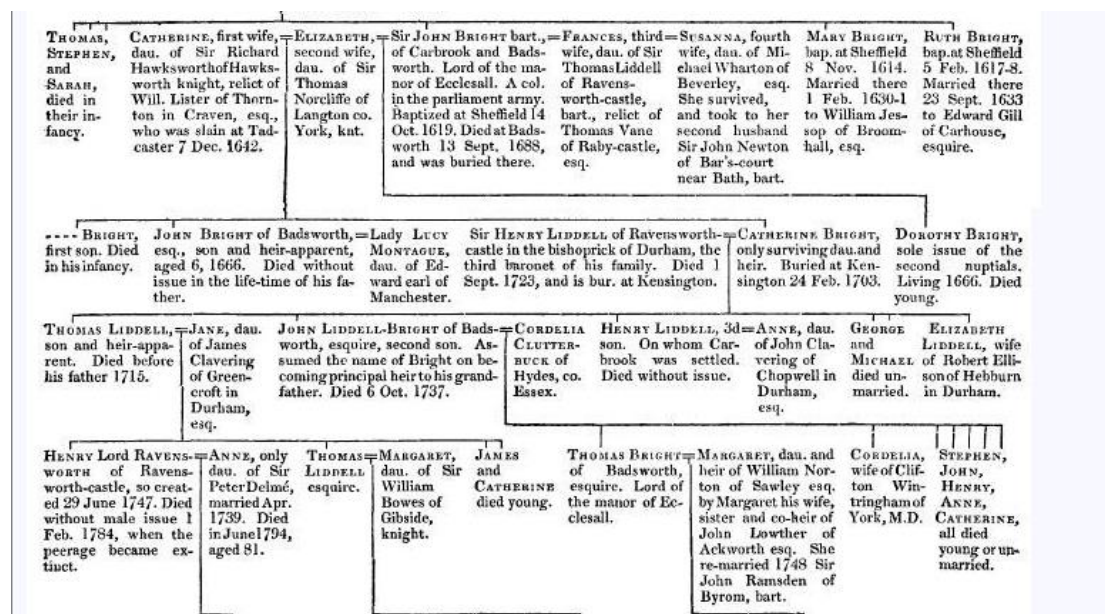

The Rev. ——— Stamford followed him; a gentleman whose knowledge rendered him dear to his own hearers, and justly respected by all who knew him. In his time the Dissenters were considerable in their numbers, and respectable in point of property. The families of Lapidge †, Waterhouse, Kiplin, and others belonged to this body. This respectable divine died in the year 1746.
