Son of Annie Marie Jacques (formerly Kipling), of 8, Renishaw Rd., Marston Moor, Chesterfield, and the late Harry Kipling.

The 2nd/5th battalion of the Sherwood Foresters was part of 176th Brigade in the 59th (2nd North Midland) Division. Harry died on the first day of the Battle of St Quentin, in the Somme area.

After suffering heavy casualties from German shellfire on 21 March, the enemy infantry succeeded in breaking through the Division's position where it met that of 6th Division in the valley of the River Hironnelle. Parties held on and continued to resist but were gradually destroyed and "mopped up". Fewer than 100 men of the 176th and 178th Brigades which had been holding the front line before the attack were assembled at roll call. Two battalion commanding officers were killed in action. At 7pm, the Division was officially relieved but 177th Brigade and various parties of ancillary units remained to take part in the continued defence.

5th and 6th (Reserve) Battalions

August 1914 : in Winchester. Depot/training units, they moved on mobilisation to Sheerness and remained in this area throughout the war. In 1918 the 6th Bn was at nearby Queenborough. Both were part of the Thames & Medway Garrison.

11th (Service) Battalion

Formed at Winchester in September 1914 as part of K2 and came under orders of 59th Brigade in 20th (Light) Division. Moved to Blackdown, going on in February 1915 to Witley and then in April to Larkhill. 21 July 1915 : landed at Boulogne.

Ebenezer was mobilised from the reserves at the start of the war and, until his death in 1918, his only hospitalisation was for frostbite and an STD.

DERNANCOURT COMMUNAL CEMETERY EXTENSION

Location Information

Dernancourt is a village 3 kilometres south of Albert. The Communal Cemetery is a little west of the village, and the Extension is on the north-west side of the Communal Cemetery.

Visiting Information

The location or design of this site makes wheelchair access impossible.

Historical Information

Field ambulances used the Communal Cemetery for Commonwealth burials from September 1915 to August 1916, and again during the German advance of March 1918. It contains 127 Commonwealth burials of the First World War.

The XV Corps Main Dressing Station was formed at Dernancourt in August 1916, when the adjoining EXTENSION was opened. The 45th and 56th (1st/1st South Midland) Casualty Clearing Stations came in September 1916 and remained until March 1917. The 3rd Australian was here in March and April 1917, and the 56th from April 1917 to February 1918. The 3rd Casualty Clearing Station came in March 1918 but on 26 March, Dernancourt was evacuated ahead of the German advance, and the extension remained in their hands until the village was recaptured on 9 August 1918 by the 12th Division and the 33rd American Division. In September it was again used by the 47th, 48th and 55th Casualty Clearing Stations under the name of "Edgehill", due to the rising ground on the north-west.

At the Armistice, the Extension contained more than 1,700 burials; it was then enlarged when graves were brought in from isolated positions in the immediate neighbourhood and certain small cemeteries, including:-

MOOR CEMETERY, EDGEHILL, DERNANCOURT, was about 800 metres West, near the top of the hill. It contained the graves of 42 soldiers from the United Kingdom who fell on the 23rd-25th March, 1918.

APRIL ON THE SOMME.

RECORD INFLUX OF EASTER PILGRIMS.

The number of pilgrims who visited the British war cemeteries in France and Belgium this Eastertide far exceeded that of any previous holiday. This may be partly due to the fact that in recent years April has become more sacred to us as British people (writes Henry Benson, M.A.).

It is probable that more people went to Etaples Military Cemetery between Good Friday and Easter Monday than to any other British burial-ground in France. A glance at the visitors' book revealed that they had made the long journey from places as far apart as Cardiff and Glasgow, Plymouth and Edinburgh, Bristol and Perth, Aberdeen and Nottingham and Norwich and Southampton. Some of them were very old and battled with fatigue in the spirit of their fallen sons and grandsons. Younger and stronger men went out to see the graves of fathers and brothers; whilst daughters laid flowers before headstones that marked where "Dad" was at rest. The pilgrims included soldiers' children and many widows. So far as I could gather, very few had previously been to France.

On the other flank 7th Queens were held up by machine guns. Their commanding officer Lt Col Christopher Bushell VC DSO¹⁹ came forward and personally led a successful attack on these, although he himself was mortally wounded. This enabled the 36th Brigade to reach and recapture the remaining ground lost to the Germans on 6 August, but they failed to reach the Morlancourt-Malard Wood road. At 7 a.m., and to plan, the 53rd Brigade now passed through, advancing astride the Bray-Corbie road. In the south the 10th Essex stormed forward in the fog and, after fierce tussles with men of the German 27th Division which cost them some 200 casualties, secured the road. Leaving the 36th Brigade to consolidate this they pressed on, their numbers down to some eighty men. But they were out of touch of the battalions on their flanks, the 8th Royal Berkshires and 7th Royal West Kents, and there appeared to be no Germans to their front. To keep direction they hugged the Bray-Corbie road. Then the fog lifted and they found that they were just a few hundred yards from the north part of Gressaire Wood. More remarkable was that immediately in front of them were two well-camouflaged German artillery batteries, with their crews taking a stand easy. It was too good a chance to miss and the Essex immediately charged in and captured the lot. Lt Col E. M. Banks, who was commanding, knew that he had too few men to provide a proper escort for the prisoners and so ordered them to go back under guard of one of his wounded men. Matters for him were made easier by the fact that the Germans gained the impression from Colonel Banks' orders that they were about to be shot and to placate him some took their boots off. He therefore ordered the remainder to do the same and they departed. He now took stock and concluded that he had reached his objective on the Red Line, but there were still no other friendly troops around. He therefore sent a runner back. Half an hour later, at about 8 a.m., elements of the 7th Royal West Kents, which had also managed to make their way up along the Bray-Corbie road, linked up with the Essex and a protective flank had now been formed, albeit a very weak one.

It was now that the Germans began to counter-attack. The first assault came from the Morlancourt direction and was against the Royal West Kents. The Essex then came under fire from Gressaire Wood. Meanwhile the 8th Royal Berkshires on the right had managed to reach the western edge of the wood, although their commanding officer was hit no less than five times by machine gun bullets when they stumbled across a number of machine-gun nests. When the fog lifted they found themselves very exposed and under heavy fire and after hanging about for three quarters of an hour and suffering increasing casualties they were forced to withdraw to the Green Line. This left the 10th Essex on their own and at 9 a.m. they were counter-attacked from Gressaire Wood. With their rear threatened by the attack on the Royal West Kents and beginning to be outflanked Colonel Banks had no option but to withdraw. He damaged the breechblocks of the guns he had captured so as to render them unusable and, under machine gun fire from both flanks, withdrew the 2,000 yards back to the Green Line. Only fifteen men, including the commanding officer, made it back.

The cemetery was begun a few days before Beaurains was captured by Commonwealth forces on 18 March 1917. It was a month before the Battle of Arras began, and the Germans were still in nearby Tilloy-les-Mofflaines. The cemetery was used (sometimes under the name of Ronville Forward Cemetery) until the beginning of June by the 14th (Light) Division Burial Officer and by fighting units. It was used again for a short time in August and September 1918, in the Second Battle of Arras. It contained, at the date of the Armistice, the graves of 129 British soldiers, 15 French soldiers and four German prisoners. It was enlarged after the armistice when graves were brought in from the surrounding battlefields and the following cemeteries.

Assault and Capture of the Drocourt-Quéant Line

A dark night, free from rain, preceded the attack on September 2 1918. It was after midnight before every battalion commander had issued his operation order, and by the time all the assaulting troops were in their assembly trenches dawn was not far off. Its arrival coincided, as planned, with zero hour, and with it came the tremendous crash that opened the barrage.

The second phase of the attack began soon after eight, when the 78th Battalion, until now held in reserve, attempted to push forward on the right of the 10th Brigade. But it could make little headway against the storm of machine-gun fire coming out of Villers-lez-Cagnicourt and from a sugar-beet processing plant at the crossroads north-east of the village. A mile east of the sunken road, on a ridge extending from Buissy to Saudemont, German artillerymen were firing over open sights. By nine o'clock the 78th had been brought to a halt 200 yards east of the sunken road

The 51st Pioneers had been working in support of the attack on the St Michiel salient in September 1918. Alfred Richard was buried at the Saint Mihiel American cemetery. His father, Alfred W., applied to administer his estate.

That said deceased departed this life *at the County of Kings*, on the *3rd* day of *October* 1918, and was at or immediately previous to his death a resident of *15 Glenada Place, Borough of Brooklyn* the County of Kings.

That your petitioner has made diligent search and inquiry for a will of said deceased and has not found any, or obtained any information that he left any; and, therefore, alleges, upon information and belief, that said deceased died without leaving any last Will and Testament.

That said deceased *of pneumonia, according to information received from the War Department* died a natural death and that your Petitioner saw the remains of said deceased after his death.

Alfred W. was a son of Richard Kipling, who was a waiter living on Broadway in 1863. Richard, a barman, and his wife Elizabeth came to the USA in 1859 on board the *Switzerland*. Richard is recorded as a barman (b Holborn, London; age 25) in the 1851 English census, and married Elizabeth Hague in London in 1856, his marriage certificate shows him as the son of a John Kipling, carpenter, whom I have not yet been able to identify (picture at left posted by Suellen on

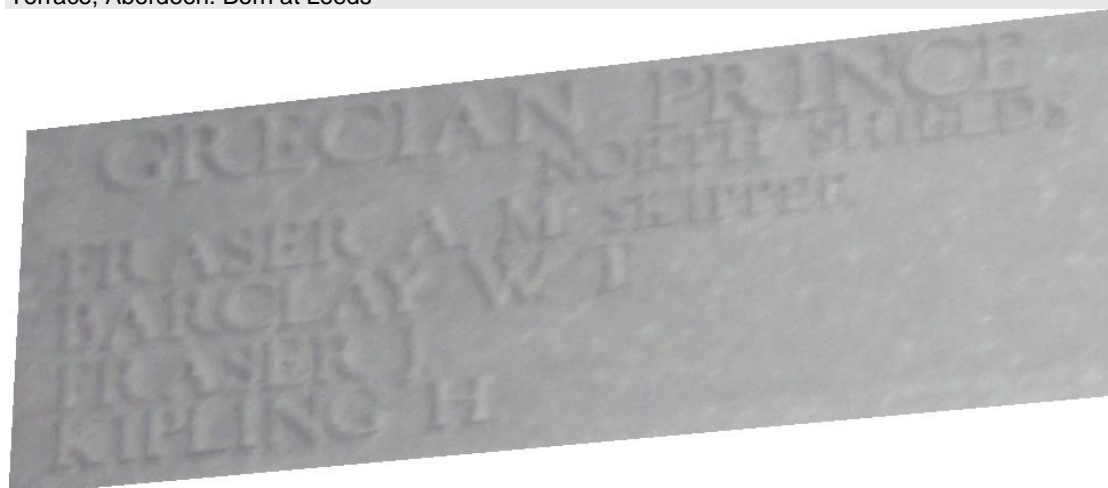

TOWER HILL MEMORIAL

Additional Information:

Son of the late George and Elizabeth Kipling; husband of Mary Elizabeth Kipling, of 53, Jasmine Terrace, Aberdeen. Born at Leeds



A few days prior to the eve of the meagre festivities that would be the Christmas of 1918, the fishing community of Scarborough had been shattered to learn of the loss of two of their menfolk with the 129 tons steam trawler 'Grecian Prince', which had been engulfed in a massive explosion during Sunday the 15TH of December 1918, reportedly after trawling up a mine whilst fishing off the coast of Northern Scotland some sixteen miles N.E. of Kinnaird Head.

Although registered in North Shields the trawler had been fishing out of Aberdeen for some time and had been carrying a crew of ten, predominantly Scottish, fishermen, and despite having sunk in less than five minutes, two of the Grecian Prince's crew had miraculously been plucked from the freezing North Sea by another trawler that had been fishing in the vicinity of the lost trawler. However, of the other eight members of her crew, there had been no sign.

Amongst the missing had been thirty-four years old: Second Fisherman Frank Tindall. Born in Scarborough at No. 60 Longwestgate on Thursday the 5th of January 1882, Frank had been the third son of Betsy and 'fried fish shop keeper' Benjamin Tindall.

A pupil of St Thomas's Board School, in Longwestgate, at the age of thirteen Frank had left formal education to begin work in Scarborough's flourishing fishing industry and had worked in a number of the town's fishing vessels until 1912, when he had moved to Aberdeen to work out of that port. Living at No.76 Victoria Road in the Torry district of Aberdeen by the outbreak of war in August 1914, by this time Frank had been the husband of Lilian Pickles, the Scarborough born [1888] eldest daughter of trawler fisherman Henry and Isabella Pickles.

Also living in Aberdeen at the outbreak of hostilities had been the Grecian Prince's cook, and Frank Tindall's brother in law; Herbert Kipling had been born in Leeds during 1882, and had been the son of City of Leeds labourer George, and Elizabeth Kipling.

Although born in the West Riding, 'Bert' Kipling had lived for much of his life in Scarborough, having arrived in the town at the turn of the century he had initially lodged with the Lenton family in Scarborough's Mill Lane and had worked in Scarborough as a 'general labourer'. Married at Scarborough's St Mary's Parish Church on Saturday the 27TH of September 1910 to Frank's youngest sister [born 1885] Mary Elizabeth 'Lizzie' Tindall, after the ceremony the couple had lived for a while with the Tindall family at No. 14 Garibaldi Street, however, by 1912 the couple had moved to No.53 Jasmine Terrace in Aberdeen, where their daughter, Eva, had eventually been born.

A risky business at any time, during the war fishing had obviously become extremely perilous due to enemy mines and the activities of a very active German submarine force. Nevertheless, fishing had continued, and Tindall and Kipling had survived numerous close shaves with the enemy and bad weather during the war only to be killed, ironically, on the doorsteps of peace and during a calm night.

An incident that had taken place at a time when the world's attention had been focused elsewhere, the sinking of the Grecian Prince had caused barely a ripple in the national press, and in 'The Scarborough Mercury' of Friday the 20TH of December the loss of two local men had been covered in a single paragraph:

'Two Scarborough men lost on a trawler - Two Scarborough men, Herbert Kipling and Frank Tindall, have lost their lives by the blowing up of the trawler Egyptian Prince by a mine'...

The same newspaper had also included the lost men's names in its 'Births, Death's, and Marriages' section:

'Kipling---Lost at sea, on 15TH December, with S.T. Grecian Prince, through mine explosion. Herbert Kipling, dearly beloved husband of Lizzie Tindall---sadly missed and deeply mourned'...

'Tindall--- Lost at sea, December 15TH,with the S.T. Grecian Prince, through mine explosion. Frank Tindall, dearly beloved son of Mrs. Tindall, late of 14 Garibaldi Street---Deeply mourned by mother, sisters, and brothers'...

Neither the bodies of Frank Tindall and Herbert Kipling, nor the other six casualties of the mining of the Grecian Princess had ever been recovered from the North Sea and the names of the eight fishermen had eventually been included on the Tower Hill Memorial in London. Situated on the city's Tower Hill, this Memorial commemorates the names of over twelve thousand officers and seamen of the British Mercantile Marine and fishing fleet that had lost their lives during the Great War of 1914-1918 who possess no known graves but the sea.

Apart from the town's Oliver's Mount Memorial, in Scarborough, the names of Frank Tindall and Herbert Kipling are perpetuated in Dean Road Cemetery [Section F, Row 16, Grave 30] on a magnificently carved, albeit paint bespattered and weathered, gravestone which also bears the names of the remainder of the Tindall family including Frank's youngest brother, Arthur Ernest, who had passed away at the age of one year and four months, on the 19TH of May 1892 and that of his father Benjamin Tindall, who had died at the age of forty six years, on the 22ND of June 1894.

The names of Frank Tindall and Herbert Kipling can be found on the reverse of this memorial along with those of brothers Benjamin Jnr., who had died at the age of forty-one years, on the 4TH of December 1913, Richard on the 29TH of October 1950, and William on the 23RD of April 1952. The memorial also contains the names of sister Eliza, who had died on the 10TH of June 1958. The memorial also bears the name of Margaret Tindall [born in Scarborough during 1875] but not the date of her demise.

Although recorded on the memorial as having passed away on the 30TH of December 1944, Herbert Kipling's wife, Annie Elizabeth Kipling had in fact died in Scarborough two years earlier, during Thursday the 31ST of December 1942. Never to remarry following the demise of her husband 'Lizzie' Kipling's funeral had taken place during the afternoon of Monday the 4TH of January 1943.

Richard ("Paddy") Flynn, deck hand, 36 Spring Garden.</p> <p>Both the survivors when picked up by the Aberdeen trawler, African Prince, were suffering from severe shock. From the information they were able to supply to Mr James Morgan, the skipper of the African Prince, it appears that as the nets were being hauled a mine was observed entangled in them. The situation was one of extreme danger, as the vessel was rolling in the swell. The order was at once given to lower the nets. As the nets fell back into the water the swell caused the mine to bump against the side of the trawler, and a terrible explosion followed, the vessel being so badly damaged that it went to the bottom in a few minutes.</p> <p>The African Prince was fishing about a mile distant from the Grecian Prince, and those on board not only heard, but felt something of the force of the explosion. The African Prince went at full speed to the spot where the Grecian Prince had been, but only pieces of the floating wreckage could be seen. Leask and Flynn were discovered clinging to some spars.</p> <p>After cruising about looking for possible survivors, the African Prince proceeded with all speed to Aberdeen, reaching port shortly after five o'clock in the evening. The two survivors, who were severely shaken and suffering from the shock of the explosion and the immersion in the sea, were landed, and taken to their homes in a taxi-cab, where they required medical treatment.</p>

A SURVIVOR'S STORY.

Alexander Leask (17), the fireman, who resides at 8 Menzies Road, told a "Journal" reporter last night that he was on deck at the time of the explosion, and the crew were engaged hauling the nets. All at once he heard someone—*he did not know who*—shout "A mine," and immediately there was a loud "bang." The explosion blew up the ship. Leask rushed forward, and was thrown on his back. He saw "Paddy" Flynn jump overboard, and he himself, in order to keep afloat, threw off his heavy oilskin and boots. He did not notice where the other members of the crew were. In a few minutes the boat went under, and the suction dragged him beneath the surface. On coming up he found himself on a raft, and did not recollect anything else until he was being resuscitated by his rescuers. He did not know at what particular part the mine struck the vessel, but he noticed that the small boat was blown to bits. After the vessel sank he did not see any of the crew, and surmised they had been killed by the explosion or drawn under by the suction and drowned. Leask went away with the vessel on Friday morning. It was his first trip with the Grecian Prince.

The Grecian Prince is registered at North Shields (SN. 4), and belongs to Richard Irvin and Sons, whose headquarters are at Albert Quay, under the management of Sir John H. Irvin, until recently a prisoner of war in Germany.

THE GRECIAN PRINCE.

Widows and Dependants of Lost Men.

All the members of the crew of the Aberdeen trawler Grecian Prince, lost by the blowing up of the vessel by a mine were married. The list of widows and dependants is as follows:—

Alexander Fraser, skipper, 52 Salisbury Terrace—wife and four of a family, eldest 12 years.

John Fraser, mate, 82a Bon-Accord Street—wife and grown-up family.

Frank Tindall, second fisherman, 89 Walker Road, Torry—wife and three children, eldest six years.

Donald Mackenzie, chief engineer, 67 Fonthill Road—wife and grown-up family, and two children at home, eldest 13 years.

William Barclay, second engineer, 47 Loch Street—wife and four children, three at school and one a baby.

Richard Shapter, deck-hand, 152 Wellington Road—wife and two children, eldest 14 years.

Herbert Kipling, cook, 53 Jasmine Terrace—wife and one child aged 18 months.

Gunner John Souter, married, understood to belong to Loosemouth.

It is noticeable that proportionately more Kipling deaths occurred in 1918, possibly because many were involved in 'reserved' occupations such as farm labour, mining and heavy industry and were only accepted or conscripted later in the war.
