

## The Kiplings of Wearmouth

What is today known as Sunderland was once the parishes of Monkwearmouth on the north bank of the river and Bishopwearmouth on the South. Nearby were the parishes of Haughton-le-Spring and Chester-le-Street. Kiplings have been present in the Wearmouth area since at least the 17<sup>th</sup> century, being particularly involved in the sea.

In 1687, a Henry Kipling of Chester-le-Street was named in a diocesan document, probably a bond, yet to be translated.



In 1714, Dorothy Kipling of Chester-le-Street was accused in the diocesan court of defamation by a Mary Robinson. The outcome of the case is not known.

This is a reference to Ambrose senior (Capt. Ambrose Kipling), who died 1801 in India.

“ Memento Mori.” Here lies the body of  
Captain **Ambrose Kipling**,  
who departed this life September 22d, 1801,  
aged 60 years and 8 months.  
One of the oldest Commanders out of this port,  
a man much respected in his lifetime, and  
now sincerely lamented.  
In deep distress with sorrows round,  
Assist me, or my barks aground;  
From rocks and shoals and dangers of the deep,  
God has preserved my soul I hope as yet.

*The Bengal Obituary: Or, a Record to Perpetuate the Memory of Departed Worth (North Park Street Burial Ground)*

Accounts have been received from Vizagapatnam of the loss of the India Trader, Captain Kepling, in a heavy gale, bound for Pegu, and of the miraculous escape of the Captain and four of the crew.

Sixteen men, including the Captain, lashed themselves to a raft, on which they did not, however, commit themselves, till about a minute before the vessel went down—in this situation, without rest, and without little food, they continued for nine days—the sea frequently washing over them, and for a great part of the time, within sight of land, though they were not discernible from the shore.

Despair, Famine, and Fatigue, drove most of them distracted, when they plunged themselves into the ocean, and put an end to their sufferings.

At length five fortunate survivors made Vizagapatam, where they were treated with the greatest care and humanity.

The Captain alone bore his fate with fortitude, and his strength was the least exhausted of any of the survivors.

*Saunders's News-Letter - Saturday 22 August 1789*

Calcutta, November 5. Two Country Ships from Pegu, the Adventure, captain Kipling, perished in the late gale in the roads. The following is an extract of a letter from Captain Kipling, dated Ballasore, 23d ultimo.

"I arrived here at 12 o'clock this day from Canker, the ship foundered on the 16th about twenty leagues from Point Palmiras in a gale of wind, the ship's company all but seven were saved in the boats, we had not time to get the smallest thing into them, neither water or even a mast or sail; we were in that disagreeable situation for three days, and got on shore near Canker where we were all plundered and stripped and made prisoners, and kept without victuals for three days; and afterwards sent away without a grain of rice, and obliged to walk to this place; I am in the most shocking condition. The boats floated off the deck with all the people in them except seven, who are drowned."

### The Fire

The Revd. Thomas Goodday (son of Bartholomew Goodday of Penrith) was Perpetual Curate of Monkwearmouth St. Peter's church from 1742 to 1768. He was an admirer and close friend of John Wesley the evangelist and founder of the Methodist Movement, who preached a number of times in Monkwearmouth church. The Revd. Goodday died in January, 1768 and was succeeded by the Revd. Jonathan Ivison who also welcomed Wesley. Jonathan Ivison had previously been the curate at Whitburn under Edward Hinton, rector, since 1753. In August 1774, aged 57, he married Isabella, aged 17, the youngest daughter of Mr Edward Watson, surgeon. They had several children, most of whom died in infancy. Notwithstanding the demands of his earlier years in the curacy, none could have been so torturous as 1790 when, during the early hours of a April morning, it is believed that a candle knocked over by him had started a fire in his homely residence in Monkwearmouth Hall. The matter weighed heavily on him and possibly contributed to his death in 1792, aged 75.

The following statement appears in the inside cover of a church book entitled 'Copy Birth Register, 1702-1790'.

*Be it known unto all Persons concerned that on the Twelfth day of April in the Year of our Lord One Thousand seven hundred and ninety, a terrible fire broke out in the Dwelling house of the Reverend Jonathan Ivison, Minister of Monkwearmouth in the said County which entirely destroyed the same, together with all the Household Furniture therewith belonging, and amongst other Articles, the Registers of Marriages, Christnings, and Burials belonging the said Parish (being of great Antiquity) were totally consumed, Except the Registers of marriages from the Sixteenth day of October in the Year of our Lord One Thousand seven hundred and eighty five, the Registers of Christnings from the Second day of September One Thousand seven hundred and Seventy nine, and the Registers of Burials from the First day of January One Thousand seven hundred and sixty eight, down to the time when the above fatal Accident happened.*

*And Whereas at a meeting of the Principal Inhabitants of the said Parish held at the Vestry on the Fourth day of January One Thousand seven hundred and ninety one it was deem'd necessary to take the Opinion of a Learned Council in the Law, together with the Opinion of the Arch Deacon of the Diocese, what Mode was to be adopted to replace such Registers so Destroyed by the Fire, when they propos'd an Advertizement to be inserted in the Newcastle Newspapers for every person concern'd to fetch Copies of such Private Registers as they had in their Possession to the Vestry where Attendance was given by the Church Wardens and several of the Principal Inhabitants of the said Parish every Tuesday for the Purpose of Entering the same in this Book.*

*We the Minister, Church Wardens and Principal Inhabitants whose names are hereunder Subscribed do upon Oath testify to the Truth of the Premises as Witness our Hands the Eighteenth day of February in the Year of our Lord One Thousand seven hundred and ninety one. Sworn at Sunderland the 18<sup>m</sup> day of February One Thousand seven hundred & ninety one. Before us:*

So it was that a register of births was started in January 1791, each of the churchwardens entering birth and/or baptismal information as received. Two separate registers were started, one on 25 January, the other on 8 February, 1791. Both ran concurrently throughout 1791. All the entries were made by either one of the churchwardens or by the curate Jonathan Ivison, and later by his successor, Thomas Gibson who married Jonathan's widow Isabella.

As one would expect, the replacement entries are incomplete – after all, only a tiny minority of the population would read the Newcastle papers of the day; family Bibles might be few or memories short and, of course, as in any age, many people would simply not bother to come forward. A few notations had been inserted by the church wardens Matthew Brod(e)rick and John Avery as late as 1797.

The front cover of the register book measuring 23.5 x 15cm has a label boldly marked 'Copy of Registers for Births' and within it a faint notation: 'By witnesses after fire'. The "first" register begins on page 5, the previous four being blank. An example of the format showing signatures in the attested entries, is shown below:

SHIP LAUNCH ON THE WEAR. — On Saturday last there was launched, at the yard of Messrs. Alfred Simey and Co., an iron screw-steamer of the following dimensions:—180 feet between the perpendiculars, 27½ feet beam, and 14 feet depth of hold. She has been built to the order of Mr. H. F. Wilcox, of this town, for himself and friends, and is to be fitted with engines of 90-horse power, by the Ouseburn Engine Works Company, of Newcastle, whose reputation for turning out first-class work is now thoroughly established. On leaving the ways, she was christened Tartessus, by Miss Ada Kipling, who is at present the guest of Mr. Wilcox. The Tartessus is expected to carry about 800 tons, all told, and is intended more especially for the Spanish fruit trade. She is a fine model, and very good results in the way of speed are anticipated. She is classed 90A Lloyds, extra strong.
